Companion printables for the article “20 Cinderella Activities for Kids” at brittanymazique.com — built for Walt Disney's Cinderella: 75th Anniversary Edition. Each template connects to a theme in the story, not just a craft. The question under each activity is the part that makes it stick.

What's Inside

- **Glass Slipper Coloring Page**

Decorate the slipper. Ask: why glass? — the symbolism of unique identity.

- **Mouse Finger Puppet Templates**

Cut and make. Ask: why is Cinderella kind to the mice when no one is watching? — integrity.

- **Character-Traits Sorting Worksheet**

Sort trait words between Cinderella and the stepfamily — character study.

- **Story-Sequencing Cards**

Cut apart and put the story back in order — narrative structure.

- **Kindness Journal Page**

Write or draw three small acts of kindness to do this week, like Cinderella with the mice.

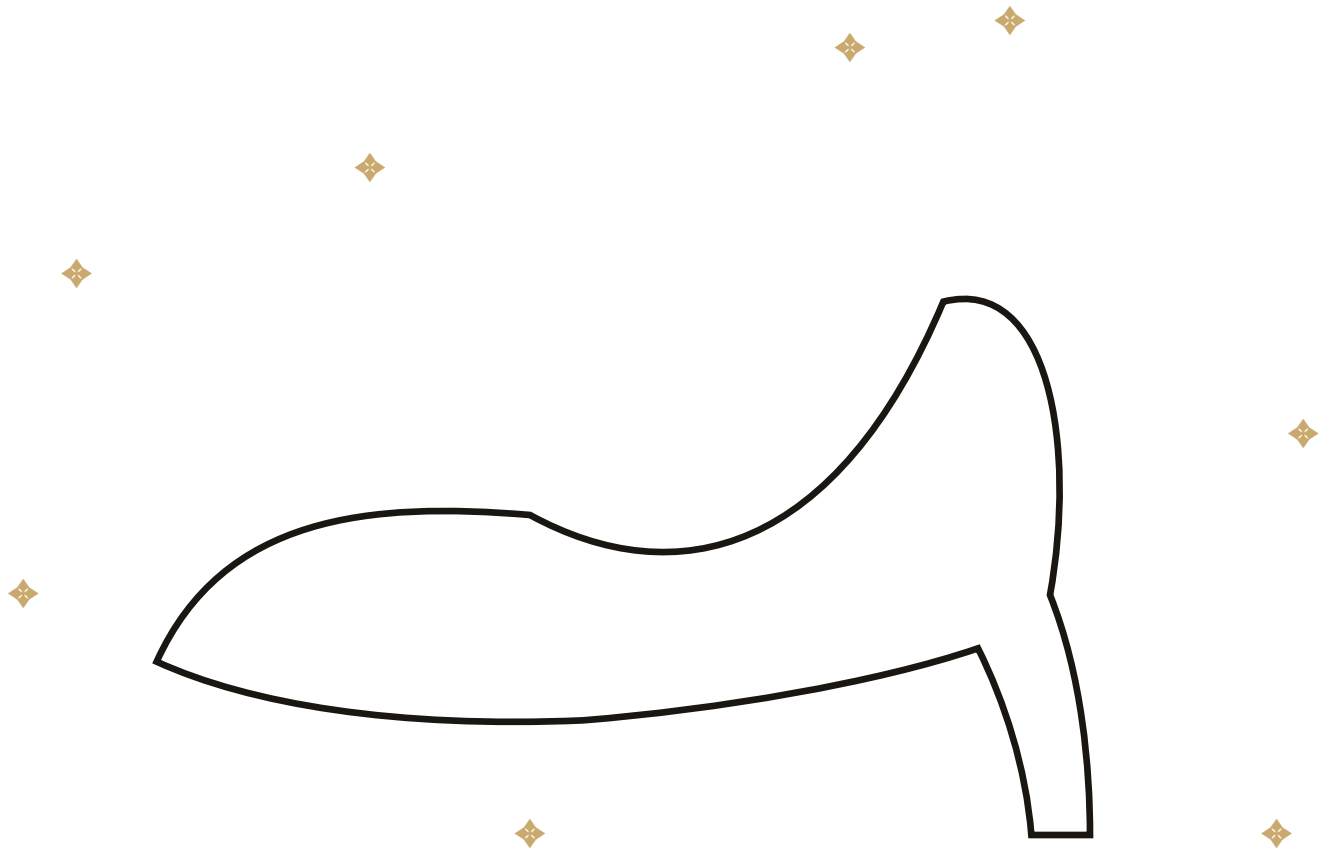
- **Around-the-World Venn Diagram**

Compare Disney's Cinderella with a multicultural variant like Yeh-Shen or Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters.

Glass Slipper Coloring Page

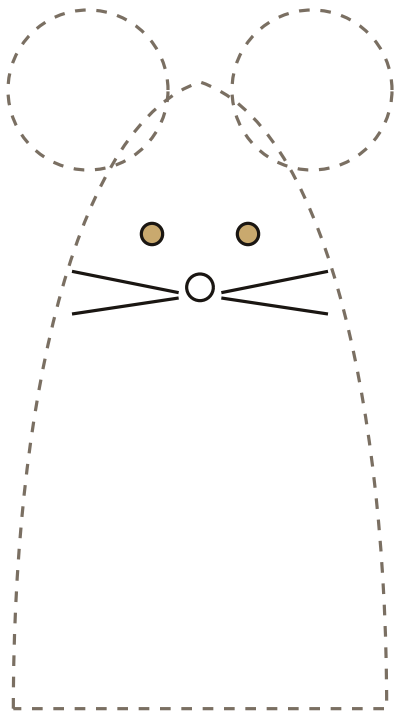
Decorate with glitter glue, sequins, ribbons, or crayons



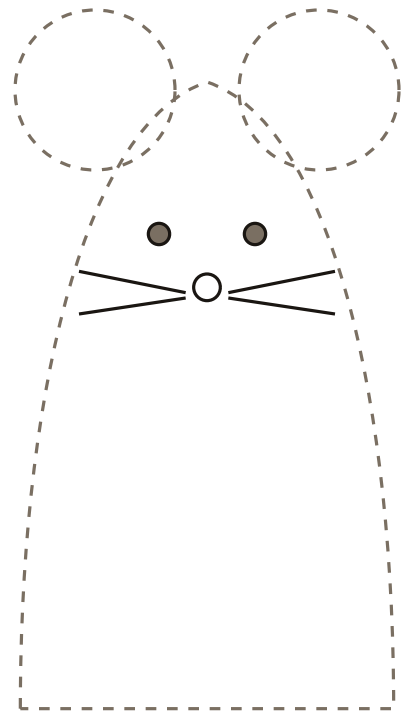
As you decorate, talk about it: Why GLASS? What does glass do that gold or silk doesn't? (Hint: you can see right through it — the slipper shows exactly who is wearing it. It fits only Cinderella, because there is only one her.)

Mouse Finger Puppets

Cut along the dashed lines · glue on googly eyes · leave the bottom open for your finger



cut on dashed lines · bottom stays open



cut on dashed lines · bottom stays open

While you make your mice, ask: Why does Cinderella feed the mice when no one is watching? What does that tell you about who she really is? (That's called integrity — being the same person whether or not anyone is watching.)

Bonus question: Is there a word that could go in BOTH columns? Talk about why. (The stepsisters were kind to their mother. Does being kind to one person and cruel to another make someone kind, or cruel, or something else?)

Story-Sequencing Cards

Cut apart, shuffle, and put the story back in order · cards are numbered on purpose — fold the corner to hide it!

1

Cinderella lives with her stepmother and stepsisters, doing all the chores.

2

An invitation arrives: every maiden is invited to the royal ball.

3

The stepsisters tear Cinderella's dress so she can't go.

4

The Fairy Godmother appears and transforms the pumpkin, the mice, and her dress.

5

Cinderella dances with the prince — but runs at midnight, losing a glass slipper.

6

The Grand Duke searches the kingdom for the girl who fits the slipper.

7

The stepmother locks Cinderella away — but the mice free her.

8

The slipper fits. Cinderella is found — the same kind girl, finally seen.

Kindness Journal

Like Cinderella with the mice — kindness when nobody is watching

Cinderella feeds the mice when no one is watching. Nobody claps. Nobody says thank you. She does it anyway — because that's who she is. Write or draw THREE small acts of kindness you could do this week when nobody is watching.

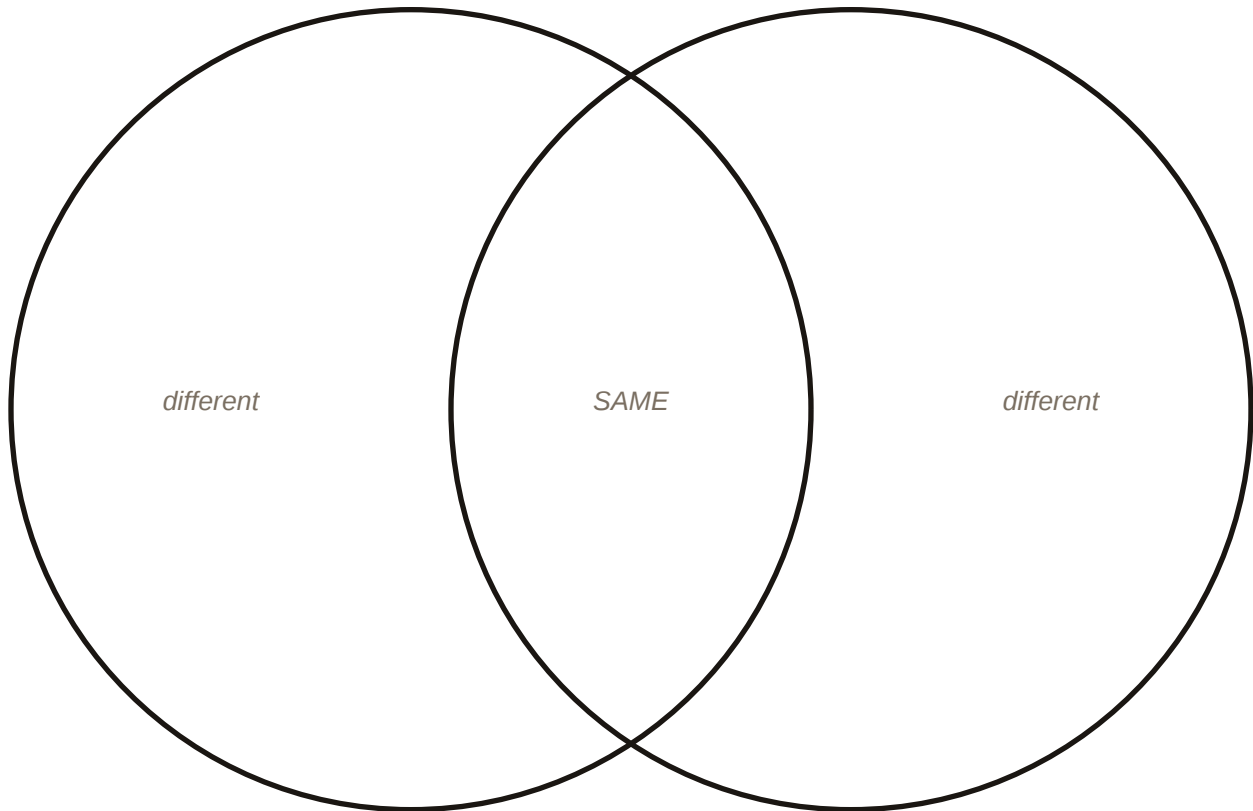
At the end of the week, talk about it: Which one was the hardest? How did it feel to be kind with no reward? That feeling has a name — integrity.
